## Pastor's Message Rev. Carol Zaagsma

I've had a pretty amazing opportunity to participate in the Nonprofit Church Leadership (NPCL) Graduate Certificate Program at Dakota Wesleyan University over the last year, and now that I've graduated, I wanted to share a summary of what we've accomplished together through this program.

First, a little background: This opportunity was created thanks to a Lilly Endowment Inc. grant given to the Dakotas and Minnesota Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church.

Fifteen clergy from the Dakotas and Minnesota completed the program and graduated in July. We each earned 21 graduate degree credits, which is a little more than one half of an MBA. For now, I have two binders full of notes and assignments to refer back to, a cohort

of colleagues to continue to consult with regarding future ideas, along with a certificate to hang on the wall!



The program included four courses: Stewarding Finances in the 21st Century, Stewarding Human Resources, Stewarding Vision, and Stewarding the Church. We studied both the economics and spirituality of giving and living generous lives; looked at the complexities of capital campaigns and endowment investments; considered how the ministry work our paid staff and volunteers both fits into our call to discipleship; took a deeper look at outcome-based job descriptions; reviewed the Drexler-Sibbet high performance teams model within the context of our congregation; learned how to identify an organization's purpose, vision and mission; looked at some efficiency and project management concepts such as SIPOC, flywheels, Gantt and PERT charts; and studied innovation, change and governance structures. Every week there was either an online lecture or video to watch, reading to do, an online discussion post to engage in and an assignment to complete.

Besides these four courses, we were expected to complete two applied projects specifically geared toward our ministry setting. The first project I developed for the fall was entitled a Multi-Generational Giving Strategy. This project included the typical stewardship campaign cycle, but added a few extra components such as the "Parents, Kids and Money Matters" workshop conducted by Thrivent Financial, and the individual witnesses shared in worship last fall. These extra components served to deepen the meaning of generous living as we worked toward our goal of creating a culture of giving. Additional objectives were to increase our electronic vehicles for giving, and increase giving to the PAUMC endowment that was created in 2010.

My second applied project was entitled Visioning along with Empowering Leaders. We began this work with a visioning workshop on February led by my coach, Dr. Alisha Vincent. Some ideas emerged to help us fulfill our vision and mission more fully, including strengthening and expanding our small group ministries, as well as to improving communications within the congregation as well as the community regarding who we are here at The PORT.

Another key component of the second applied project was to increase laity involvement and develop leaders who are prepared to lead with autonomy and purpose. A group called The Navigators, comprised of Lay Leader, Church Council Chair, and Pastor, was formed to share responsibility for stewarding our vision. We also created a document that outlines expectations of our leaders, which will help train new leaders and recalibrate tenured leaders each year.

The last part of this applied project included the 65<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration on May 18 as a way to reconnect us to our past and encourage us in the present and into the future.

As you can see, it was a full commitment, and some great outcomes were gained. I am certainly glad I took the opportunity to be part of the first cohort to enter the program. Now I find myself excited about a little extra free time without classes each week, and yet I'm also beginning to imagine what might be next for us to

work toward in strengthening God's Kingdom here on earth. If you've got an idea, please come see me!

## School Supply Drive

Many thanks to all who participated in this year's School Supply Drive. It is a blessing to help or neighborhood children start the school year with the supplies they need to succeed.



### Generous Giving



Thank you for your support of several mission opportunities throughout the summer. This year's MN Annual Conference Love Offering supported a Minnesota

missionary to Laos, the Volunteer Lawyers Network, and Scholarships for first-time mission trip participants. This offering, received May 19, totaled \$481.15.

The United Methodist Special offering for Peace with Justice Sunday on June 16, which supports a number of United Methodist ministries aimed to bring healing, support and reconciliation to areas where human rights are being violated, totaled \$163.50.

And the Special offering for Native American Ministries on July 14 totaled \$316.00. This special offering helps equip and empower Native American pastors, congregations and seminary students to maintain and grow ministries that honor the Native American heritage in Minnesota and many other locations.

## Special Offering for UMCOR

Through the end of August, we are receiving donations to UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) specifically for their work with humanitarian organizations along the US-Mexico border. UMCOR has already distributed over 46,000 hygiene kits to transitional shelters in the area. Hygiene kits include a hand towel, washcloth, toothbrush, toothpaste, bandages, bathsize soap, comb, and metal nail file or nail clippers, all in a plastic gallon size sealable bag, which serves as a much-welcome item of relief for those seeking asylum who have been traveling with so few resources on hand.

If you'd like to participate, please make your check payable to PAUMC and include a note that it is for UMCOR, or offer a donation through our GivePlus+ App and indicate it is for UMCOR. While we are quite a distance from the southern border, we can still offer a sense of our vision to be a "Safe harbor along life's journey" by supporting these humanitarian efforts regardless of our own thoughts about immigration laws.

## Mission Summit 2019

This is hosted by the Minnesota United Methodist Missions Promotions Team, and will feature presentations about the future of missions, United Methodist Social Principles, Haiti Partnership, health ministries, OC Ministries, agricultural ministries, Hubbard UMC Outreach Ministries, and the Mid-West Mission Distribution Center near Springfield, IL. There will also be enough supplies on hand to create 500 health/hygiene kits. The event is free with lunch included, and every church attending will receive \$50 seed money to start a new outreach ministry. ## **MN Annual Conference News**

### Holy Spirit Breakthroughs

Participants at the 2019 Minnesota Annual Conference session in St. Cloud were inspired to live into this year's theme "*Dare to Reach: Love Boldly!*" and many shared specific ways in which they see the Holy Spirit breaking through in their congregations and communities.

Each individual received a perforated sheet with tools to help them live out the theme, and one section invited people to record a way in which their congregation is daring to reach new people or loving boldly. Dozens of people turned in responses by placing them on a display board for others to see.

Some named innovative ways in which they are connecting with neighbors. For example, members of Federated Church in Morris are mentoring those involved in a local "treatment court" and forming relationships with people living at low-income apartment complexes in the community. This has resulted in four new families attending worship—and in 2018, the church had 21 new professions of faith, seven baptisms, and 17 new children.

Some forms of outreach named by other attendees: "Marvel movie Mondays" and a "backyard Bible club" offered by Main Street Church in North Branch, a grocery giveaway hosted by Community UMC in Monticello, Ely UMC's "Gift of Giving" program through which members purchase holiday gifts for nursing home and assisted living residents, and a party in the park organized by Buffalo UMC. Others talked about welcoming unchurched neighbors to enjoy their community gardens and Vacation Bible School.

Meanwhile, some Annual Conference attendees lifted up new worship experiences they are offering. For example, Aitkin UMC is organizing a weekly "Bible and brew" gathering at a newly opened brew pub—and Mount Bethel UMC in Inver Grove Heights is launch-

ing an informal and contemporary Wednesday night worship service called "Forge" that focuses on conversation around the Bible. Holy Spirit breakthroughs were shared on a display board at Annual Conference for all to see.



Many attendees named ways in which they are sharing

God's love with the children in their communities. Hope UMC in Duluth is opening a childcare center that will serve 66 children; the hope is to build loving and supportive relationships with each of their families. Wesley UMC in Hibbing offers a free after-school program on Wednesdays that includes playtime, a snack, a Bible lesson, a craft, and worship; it has grown to 58 participants over the past two years. Similarly, Sauk Centre UMC hosts K-5 students for breakfast and activities on late-start days during the school year; it averages 30 kids each time. Common Ground UMC in Cambridge is hosting a free event for children at a local park each month this summer-the first will be a carnival day, the second will have an engineering theme, and the third will be about music and theater. And First UMC in New Ulm collects and donates diapers and other baby hygiene items to families in need through its "Blessed Bottoms" diaper assistance program. Others mentioned Holy Spirit breakthroughs in the form of partnerships with local schools, after-school programs, and trunk-or-treat events.

Some attendees shared ways in which they are working to be inclusive of those with special needs or challenges. For example, one person mentioned installing a Tloop electronic hearing system in worship and fellowship areas so as to bring announcements, prayers, scripture readings, and sermons directly into the ears of those with hearing aids. Another wrote about creating a Dementia-friendly worship service. And someone else talked about live streaming worship to reach those unable to attend in person.

Last, some Annual Conference attendees highlighted ways in which they are healing a broken world in tangible ways. For example, Hubbard UMC has been raising money to build wells and provide clean water in Africa. This year, the church made a five-year, \$50,000 pledge to this effort.

As Rev. Susan Nienaber, Big Waters District superintendent, told attendees at Annual Conference: "Whatever the future of The United Methodist Church...we create that future with how we are being church with one another, in our communities and all across the state of Minnesota, right here, right now."

Thanks be to God for all of the ways in which you are reaching new people for Christ and boldly loving the people in your lives and mission fields!
