

Pastor's Message Rev. Carol Zaagsma

One of my favorite teachings by Jesus is the parable of the soils. In it Jesus says, "Let anyone with ears listen!" (Matthew 13:9)

Kay Lindahl, in her book *The Sacred Art of Listening*, writes, "Perhaps one of the most precious and powerful gifts we can give another person is to really listen to them, to listen with quiet, fascinated attention, with our whole being, fully present. This sounds simple, but if we are honest with ourselves, we do not often listen to each other so completely."

I just returned from ten days at General Conference, which is a gathering of United Methodists from all over the world. This happens every four years, and this year 864 voting delegates, half clergy and half lay delegates, reported for duty.

I was elected as a reserve delegate, which means most of my time was spent observing from the stands while remaining poised and available should I need to replace one of the two elected clergy delegates from Minnesota if something called them away or they needed a break.

As such, I had a lot of time to observe the proceedings.

It didn't take long for me to realize that we, as a body of denominational leaders, have a long ways to go when it comes to listening.

There was an opportunity to create space for better listening at this General Conference. The rules committee, at the request of the 2012 General Conference, proposed a new way to discuss some of the topics that have been dividing us. "Rule 44," as it was called, would have every delegate assigned to a small group of no more than 15 people, along with a facilitator and a scribe to take notes. Small group conversations would occur with summaries passed on to a Facilitation Group. The Facilitation Group would discern trends and bring forth legislation that took into account the original petitions as well as the small group notes, and the body could then debate and vote on the legislation. Ultimately, Rule 44 was voted down (57% said "no"); an official opportunity to listen differently to one another was thereby lost. Only 43% of the body willing to listen to one another in a new way.

Lindahl continues, "Listening is a creative force. Something quite wonderful occurs when we are listened to fully. We expand, ideas come to life and grow, we remember who we are. Some speak of this force as a creative fountain within us that springs forth; others call it the inner spirit, intelligence, true self. Whatever this force is called, it shrivels up when we are not listened to and it thrives when we are."

There is an unusual dynamic at General Conference in that our bishops do not have a vote on the business at hand. They do preach during worship, and they act as presiding officers/parliamentarians during plenary sessions, but they only have a voice if they are asked. Someone asked them on Tuesday of our second week to speak...to lead...us through this impasse on the most divisive topics. The request was to bring us, by the next day, a non-binding sense of a way forward through our differences. 46% of the body voted "no, we don't want such a report" – 46% didn't have any interest in listening to what our bishops...our denomination's spiritual leaders...had to say!

I'd like to see us get better at listening. There's a long way to go at General Conference, so maybe we could just start right here with you and me.

"Listening well takes time, skill, and a readiness to slow down," Lindahl concludes, "to let go of expectations, judgments, boredom, self-assertiveness, defensiveness. I've noticed that when people experience the depth of being listened to like this, they also begin to listen to others in the same way. Listening is an art that calls for practice. Imagine if we all spent just a few minutes each day practicing the art of listening, being fully present with the person we are with. There would be a collective sigh of contentment and joy. Listen!"

Jesus calls us to listen. One needn't look far to find commentaries about how progress on the business at hand was hindered at this General Conference. Dare I say that if we all learn better to listen, we might find ourselves in a better place in the years to come? I pray it may be so.

Spotlight by Steven L Soucy



Let's start by dropping a few names: Hubert Humphrey, Walter Mondale, Orville Freeman, Elmer Anderson, Wendell Anderson, Al Quie, Rudy Perpich, Paul Wellstone, Mark Dayton, Tom Harkin, and Tom Daschle. In addition to being well-known political leaders, all these men share something else in common; they've all worked with Cy Carpenter on important rural and community issues.

This month we're going to tell part of the story behind the famous names and continue talking about how a concern for others has always been a part of Fran and Cy Carpenter's lives.

As you remember, the Carpenters moved to Bloomington in 1965 after Cy had been appointed as a state lob-byist for the Minnesota Farmers Union. He must have done a pretty good job because he became President of the Minnesota Farmers Union in the 70's and was elected President of the National Farmers Union in 1984. As National President, Cy headed an organization with more than 300,000 family farm members in 20 states. As one of the leading voices in rural America, Cy has worked with national, state and local leaders on issues ranging from farm policy and international trade to rural employment and disadvantaged youth.

Cy has also been a long-time advocate for developing programs to meet the special needs of seniors through expanded programs and services. He chaired the Minnesota Board on aging in the late 80's, and served as a board member in the National Council of Aging under President Carter.

Cy has also been a member of the board of directors of Green Thumb Inc., which is a national non-profit organization whose mission is to strengthen families, communities, and the nation by providing older and disadvantaged individuals with opportunities to learn, work and serve others. Founded in 1965, Green Thumb is best known as America's oldest and largest provider of mature worker employment and training services. The organization has expanded its services to bring workforce opportunities to more than 40,000 mature workers, dislocated workers, welfare participants, and adults with special needs in 44 states and Puerto Rico.

Truth be told, Cy's been involved in more worthwhile causes than we've got space to list. So next time you see him, be sure to ask about his plan to create more telecommuting jobs and businesses in rural areas, or his "Experience Works" program to provide meaningful employment for low income farm people. Then again, maybe you'll want to ask about the "Green View" program that uses rural people to staff rest areas across the state, or "Camp Buckskin," a special camp for disadvantaged kids near Ely. Trust me, if the question is "What can I do for others?" he's got the answer.

Cy will also quickly tell you that Fran's been a full partner in everything he's done. "She really is the wind beneath my wings," said Cy. Actually, Fran smiles and puts it a little differently: "Whenever there's a good man, there's a better wife."

Before completing the story, we've got to answer the question, "How did the Carpenter's come to PAUMC?" After the kids left the home in the mid-90's, Fran and Cy left Atonement Lutheran and joined

PAUMC. "We liked the close congregation here and it seemed so friendly and outgoing that we felt at home," said Fran. "When it's right, you just feel it, and at PAUMC we know we're around our kind of people."
