

### Pastor's Message Rev. Carol Zaagsma

This year's birthday brings me into a new decade of life. If I'm very lucky, it might be that I've lived half my life and still have half yet to go. Sure enough, statisticians have predicted such a thing – females born the year I was born have a 17.7% chance of living to 100. Of course, this statistic also reveals that 82.3% don't reach centenarian status, so the odds are what they are. Time will tell about this matter for me.

I was enjoying a pre-birthday evening out with friends not long ago. One of them asked me what I've learned in life thus far. A few thoughts crossed my mind, but what rose to the top is this: I've learned not to care so much about what other people think.

Not in the way of not caring what other people think about faith, family, sports, automobiles, music, or even politics, as I do care about hearing those perspectives from other people. I think it's more along the lines of not caring what other people think *about me*.

Oh sure, from time to time this struggle still surfaces – I want to wear something to an event that will make me fit in...or play my trumpet with few errors so other people will think I'm good...I mow the lawn as often as I do because I care what the neighbors will think if I don't...and of course I care about how people perceive me doing my job.

But I still maintain that I've learned not to care so much - or at least to *care less* - what other people think about me.

I noticed this perspective coming on not that long ago, and it seems to be building momentum. I suppose it could be a bad thing if it's taken to the extremes, but so far I kind of like it. It's making me more courageous in the way of taking greater risks...adventuresome sorts of risks...the kinds of risks that throw caution to the wind when the greatest concern is what other people will think.

This is a very minor example, mind you, but my living room has needed a new coat of paint since I moved in a couple years ago. I have lived my whole life in *neutral* houses. Well, one house had a very bold burnt orange paint in the laundry room...but for the most part, the question has been white or off-white. The most adventuresome paint I've ever purchased was a very light tan. But I've got my sights set on an accent wall, which is basically a wall that is a different color than the other walls in a room. A gallon of paint came home with me the other day – a deep, dark blue. It used to be I would

make a neutral decision because I cared about whoever was going to move in after me and what they thought of me based on the color scheme in the house, but no more. It's liberating to care less about what other people think.

Perhaps even more important than this, though, is the second half of my answer to my friend's question: I've learned not to try so hard to force people into being how I think they ought to be. I would say that there have been a number of times when I've felt embarrassed or upset about what somebody else said or did when I was with them. It was as if I was projecting my thoughts about what should be said or done, and expecting them to perform accordingly. But when I began freeing myself from living under the ideals of others, I realized I needed to stop placing those ideals on other people, too. The result of that is a much more enjoyable time for everyone, I think. And from a faithbased perspective, these lessons I've learned in life more closely align with the idea that God created and gifted us each as unique and diverse people. We are not all meant to do or say things that everyone else expects.

Paul writes, "I wish that all were as I myself am. But each has a particular gift from God, one having one kind and another a different kind." (1 Cor. 7:7)

Perhaps it's natural inclination for someone to wish (and want to mold others) into people like they are. In terms of church, that plays out in wanting everyone else to like the same hymns you like, or wear certain types of clothes to church that you deem appropriate, or behave (or raise children) in certain ways that you are most comfortable with.

It seems to me if God wanted or expected conformity in all these things, we would have been created with much more uniformity. But instead, in several places the Bible refers to such differing gifts and the diversity that comes as a result. In my first half-century of life, I've come to accept the ways in which I march to the beat of my own drum, as well as appreciate the ways others do the same. And most of all,

I've come to see this as a gift from God to be celebrated rather than controlled. Maybe you see evidence of this, too.

#### Update on Roof Issues

This summer we have been experiencing problems with roof leaks affecting the Wesley room. The roof over this wing has served us well for over 20 years, but has reached a point where replacement is necessary. The cost for a high quality, built-up replacement roof will be approximately \$43,500 and the Trustees have a commitment of \$25,000 from the Bazaar committee, \$10,115 from the Capital fund, and up to \$10,000 from the Facilities Maintenance fund to cover this expense. Work is scheduled to start in September.
