

Pastor's Message Rev. Carol Zaagsma

In October, I enjoyed some much-anticipated time away and thought you might be interested in what I was up to. First of all, I want to share the news that I got married. Linda Dicks and I met 12 years ago. We met at a country-western two-step dance. It's sort of a miracle that we met that night, and perhaps that is a story for another day. We are both grateful, and carry a sense that God had a hand in bringing us together.

Perhaps some of you reading this will be uncomfortable with such an assertion that God had something to do with us meeting. And to be sure, I've had a lot of sleepless, agonizing nights myself, trying to reconcile my faith while being part of the LGBTQ community. Again, perhaps that's a story for another day. I am grateful for God's persistence with me in the wrestling, and the ways God has continued to call me to ministry again and again and again.

If you are among those who struggle with this news, I pray that you will be open, at least for a time, to wrestling with it rather than just making up your mind in the instant it takes to read this article. I am more than willing to have an open and honest conversation with you. You may also want to read one of the books that are widely recommended, including *Is It a Choice?* by Eric Marcus, or *God and the Gay Christian* by Matthew Vines. The first book answers many common questions people have about gay and lesbian people, while the latter takes a closer look at the handful of scriptures many of us wrestle with related to this topic.

Neither one of us grew up imagining we would ever be able to get married. As you know, it wasn't even legal here in Minnesota until August 1, 2013. The Supreme Court ruling on June 26, 2015, then made it legal across the whole United States. That was just 5 years ago. It is heart wrenching to reflect back on that time when the validity of LGBTQ relationships, and indeed the very worth of individuals in the LGBTQ community, was so publicly and vehemently debated. Let me just say that it shapes how you walk through life when others believe your own very existence is vile.

All that said, due to the pandemic, we had a very small wedding, with only our clergy person and witnesses present. We hope to celebrate more broadly at a later date. We are so grateful now to be legally married. As much of a commitment as we had made to one another over the course of the past 12 years, it is now even deeper and stronger. And we give God heartfelt thanks for that.

After the wedding, we drove to the Smoky Mountains in Tennessee. I've shared a couple of our photos below.

In every appointment interview I've had in United Methodist congregations (Saint Paul, Mankato, and here at The PORT), I have been asked how I would treat gay or lesbian persons in the congregation. Perhaps the real test is how a congregation handles hearing that their pastor is part of the LGBTQ community.






Advent Small Group Study

Conference-wide News Related to COVID-19 by Bishop Bruce R. Ough

On Tuesday, Oct. 27, Bishop Bruce R. Ough turned the dial on the Minnesota Conference's <u>Phased Re-Gathering Plan for Churches</u> from yellow to orange. Below is a letter he sent to Minnesota United Methodists explaining the reason for the change:

CBS News reported the following on Saturday: "There are new signs that the nation's months long battle against the



coronavirus is moving in a dangerous direction. There were more than 83,000 confirmed cases reported Friday, marking a new record high for a single day in the country. The outbreak is also more widespread. The latest surge is pushing the number of infections to more than 8.4 million and increasing the death toll past 223,000 according to Johns Hopkins University... 41 states reported an increase in average new cases. Fifteen states also showed record hospitalization, indicating more precautions are needed - fast."

Meanwhile, the Minnesota Department of Health reported these statistics and recommendations to the religious community last Tuesday:

- There have been more than 1,000 cases a day in Minnesota in recent days representing the most widespread community spread since the start of the pandemic.
- A look at how spread has increased in Minnesota over just the past few weeks (the numbers listed are cumulative since the start of the pandemic):

	3 weeks ago	Last week
Cases associated with wedding	365	570
Outbreaks associated with wedding	41	62
Cases associated with a funeral	124	136
Outbreaks associated with a funeral	18	20
Cases associated with worship	105	121
Faith community outbreaks	18	20

- If 100 people come to in-person worship, statistically at least six are going to be infectious right now. The advice given by a state epidemiologist: Meet virtually instead of in-person.
- The current rate of community spread is 37.6 percent. (A rate of 20 percent or more signifies caution. A rate

of 30 percent or more is considered high-risk.)

• Someone asked the question: Where are we in terms of red light, yellow light, green light in terms of how we should act? The response from a state epidemiologist: Dark orange.

The next six to 12 weeks will be critical, according to Dr. Michael Osterholm, director of the Center for Infectious Disease Research and Policy at the U of MN and one of the nation's leading infectious disease experts.

For all these reasons, we are turning the dial on our phased re-gathering plan back to orange. Doing no harm, acting for the common good, and protecting the most vulnerable among us is how we love our neighbor. What this means: I'm asking you to limit your in-person gatherings to 10 people or fewer while wearing masks and maintaining social distancing. Group gatherings have been the most significant source of the spread of COVID-19 in recent weeks. We have the power to help change the trajectory of this pandemic.

Yes, the orange phase is more restrictive than what the governor's office currently allows. I understand the challenge this places on our churches, but given all the data before us, I believe this is the most prudent course of action. At a very minimum, I request you adhere to the governor's guidelines and closely watch the data in your community. If your school district is not holding in -person classes, then the church probably should not be having in-person worship either (this link always has the latest county-by-county 14-day case numbers, along with associated recommendations for school districts; it's a good tool for us to use to help guide our decisionmaking). We trust you to make decisions, in consultation with local officials, that will protect the vulnerable, our neighbors, and each other and still provide meaningful spiritual leadership to your community. Thank you for the creative, adaptive spirit you bring to our common work of healing a broken world in these critical days.

Remember, the church is not closed! We will continue to be creative in how we minister in these unprecedented times, and together we can make it through this pandemic. Our actions now will save lives. And isn't that the business we are ultimately in? Salvation - life for all people!



On a call with Bloomington Public Health, we were told that they didn't want to tell us to cancel, knowing how important these events are

to churches. It was recommended instead that we do something virtually, and so that is what we have decided to do. We are currently exploring website platforms for selling merchandise and should have a path forward soon.

The small group that has done the planning thus far will handle the event, with COVID precautions in place. You can help by letting your friends know that there are still

The Bazaar will still be held on Friday, Nov. 13 from 9:00 am - 6:00 pm and Saturday, Nov. 14 from 9:00 am - 3:00 pm. After people shop and pay online they will come to the church and pick up their items curbside during the posted hours for the Holiday Bazaar.

We know that a virtual sale is not optimal for everyone and we certainly want all of our members to be able to shop, so during the sale we will have a limited number of in-person shopping timeslots (2 people at a time for 30-minute timeslots). Please know that as the pandemic wears on, ministries here at The PORT are very much needed and appreciated, even if they have transitioned to virtual meetings and fellowship opportunities, along with curbside mission outreach events. Help us continue on strong

Our finance committee asks that you prayerfully consider your commitment to the health of our congregation while returning your completed pledge card to the church office by Sunday, November 22. Building Repairs

We've recently had a few things go awry in the church building. A couple of doors stopped working (one wouldn't open on your way out of the south entrance and the other had a lock that wouldn't tighten for the door to stay unlocked as you enter the north entrance); and once the boilers got turned on, we discovered a pump that needed to be replaced so that the Wesley Room and Pastor's Office would receive heat. Thank you to Steve Knopp for fixing both doors, and to Harvey Erstad with Steve Knopp for replacing the pump.

We also had our roofing company inspect our roof this fall. They noted a number of concerns, some of which involved tree branches hanging too close. Thank you to Wayne Andersen and his son Jeff, along with support from Sharon Beckler, for taking care of some of these items that were within our ability to fix.

The roofing company also noted that the fellowship

hall roof, along with the four flat roofs around the entryways, are all within five years of their life expectancy, so we are now planning for those significant replacement expenses as they are required.

Memorial Picnic Table

We have a new addition to the Memorial Garden – a picnic table purchased with memorial gifts given in memory of Pastor Carol's dad. Thank you to Dave Smith for putting it together. It's a commercial-grade steel picnic table with benches attached, and is finished

with a green coating for yearround protection from the weather, so should be in good shape and enjoyed for years to come.
